Adelaide Jean-Pierre is brimming with enthusiasm and energy and never stops moving for a second. She was born at home to a mother (who conveniently was a mid-wife so knew what to expect!). Her father was an accountant and her parents' professions may have influenced Adelaide's life choices. Adelaide is the eldest of twelve children and was followed by seven sisters and four brothers. However, her innate friendliness helped her adjust and she eventually became resigned to our long cold winters. (St Lucia is pretty well a constant temperature of 30C.)

Most of Adelaide's career was spent at the Convent of Sisters of Charity, Old General Hospital, and she loved every minute of it. After twenty-five years full-time, she decided to work part time as a palliative care community health nurse. She mostly confines her hours to mornings and this gives her time for many other interests. She joined GSAC several years ago. She volunteers for our November bazaar and often works in the kitchen on Thursdays. She loves cooking, especially soups. She travels the world—to many of the other Caribbean islands but also has been to Britain and France several times.
